Winter Rendezvous, Annual Meeting for 2017 To Be Held in the Catskill Mountains

The 2017 Winter Rendezvous will bring us back to the Catskill region. As Rendezvous Chair I look forward to sharing this special place with all of you. The Frost Valley YMCA is a beautiful campus nestled in a picturesque valley flanked by Slide Mounatian, the highest in the Catskills, and the head waters of the Beaverkill & Willowemoc. These legendary waters are known as the birthplace of American fly fishing.

Iulius Forstmann – founder of the Forstmann Woolen Company - broke ground on what would become known as the Forstmann Castle in 1916. For forty years, this majestic property on 2,200 acres of the Catskills would serve as the summer home for the Forstmann family.

On Christmas Eve, 1956, Mr. Forstmann and YMCA executives agreed on terms that would allow the YMCA to purchase the property and make it the new home of Camp Wawayanda, which would eventually become the Frost Valley YMCA. The purchase included the main house – 40 rooms, 7 fireplaces, and 6 baths - all fully furnished - as well as a dairy farm with a dozen buildings, and 22 Holsteins, 14 heifers, and a bull.

Over half a century has passed since that fateful Christmas Eve and the Forstmann Castle, now more prominently referred to simply as "The Castle," stands firmly as an anchor tethering the past and future generations together.


10. Will Soter reviewed plans for winter rendezvous 2017 at Frost Valle YMCA to be held March 23-26, 2017.

Not sure if it was the lack of winter weather over much of our state or the crazy spring weather patterns but some major variations in outdoor activities were the rule rather than the exceptions during this year's spring outings. Some of the finest fly fish-

ing in recent memory was noted by many of the skilled and seasoned anglers with high hopes and expectations of it continuing through the season. This has certainly been a high point of the year for those involved. Trout fishing on the local reservoirs has also been good and this was a rare year in which ice was gone before the season opened.

On the other hand, the Spring Turkey Season has not showed signs of any improvement over our downward trend in recent years. A lot of extra scouting is required to locate enough birds to hunt and there seems to be fewer and fewer areas with any real concentration of birds. I guess the good old days when it was common to hear several birds gobbling from one location are gone forever. Hope the rains did not add to the problem by increasing the mortality of the young. It also appears that the mating urges of many gobblers were finished long before the season ended.

In my area, black flies had not been much of a problem in recent years, but that has changed dramatically in some sections. Deer ticks were also a major concern. I dug two ticks, including a female deer tick, out of myself during turkey season and I know others who had problems with them. While the black flies may only be a source of discomfort, the tiny deer ticks are the devils associated with Lyme Disease. Go online for information on identification and make sure to take extra precautions during any outdoor activities.

Summer is here! In the Northern Adirondacks, we had spring weather in December and March and now we are in full-blown hot and humid summer at the begin-





REGION 6

Spring seemed to come early and then rather disappear in late April through mid-May. Rather dry conditions have water levels at mid-summer flows and fishing has been hit and miss on area rivers, lakes and streams. Turkey hunting John Wainwright seemed about normal. I floated the Mohawk River



vesterday and bass were still in their post spawn shut down but it was a perfect day to be on the river. Hundreds of resident geese and ducks abound on this ancient and historic river. Unfortunately, the pair of bald eagles who built their nest on one of its many small islands last year came down along with the giant cottonwood that cradled it some time in early spring. We assume it was in early April since broken eggs shells were evident in what remained of the nest. Hopefully, the adults had time to rebuild and try again. We did see two adults flying in the same area.

Fly fishing on the West and East Canada Creeks and the Black River has been good with nice hatches of Hendrickson mayflies in late April and early May. We're starting to see Light Cahill mayflies as well as several species of caddis, which certainly adds to the enjoyment of catching trout on the surface. However, the West Canada, as far as I'm concerned, seems to be mostly a nymphing stream with my favorite size 10 bead head prince nymph fooling a good number of holdover browns in the 14 to 18 inch range. I've heard of some good catches of brook trout in smaller Adirondack ponds and walleye on Oneida Lake.

What we could use now is some steady rain to increase flows. Hinckley Reservoir was reported to be 14 feet below normal last week, making it difficult for campowners to put in docks and use water craft This has been an ongoing problem since the water is a major source of drinking water for the City of Utica and for power generation. Recreational use seems to be the lowest priority, including the fish and aquatic organisms in West Canada Creek.

Well, here's hope of a safe and productive late spring and summer and I hope to see many of you at the summer Rendezvous.

Or why fishing has declined on Seneca Lake. All I know for sure is DEC takes good care of Lake Ontario with its stocking program, lamprey control, bait stocking, lake surveys and status of the lake meetings yearly. The Finger Lakes seem to be lost in the budget and their attention.

The "Dark Side" of Mosquitoes

This column appeared as "Adirondoc" in the May-June, 2016 issue of Adirondac, the magazine of the Adirondack Mountain Club. Guidelines appreciates receiving permission from ADK and Dr. Welch to reprint it here.

All who hike or camp in the Adirondacks have a particularly bad mosquito story. Many of us return from a few days in the woods with arms and necks covered with mementos of our visits. We do not, however, view mosquito bites as serious health threats. Should we?

On its surface, the answer would seem to be "yes." Sharing syringes and needles is a very efficient way to spread blood-borne infections. Most mosquitoes are promiscuous, taking blood from several individuals of many species, with no mechanism for sterilizing themselves. So, mosquitoes might be considered very dangerous disease vectors.

There certainly are diseases that depend upon mosquito transmission. In fact, it is fair to say that more humans are killed by mosquitoes than by any other animal. Viruses transmitted by mosquitoes generally are not passed "passively" from bug to person, but must infect the insect before transmission. Thus, transmission is limited to the specific species of mosquito that are susceptible to specific infections. New York has about seventy species of mosquitoes, only a few of which transmit disease.

Mosquito-borne viruses are called "arboviruses," and there are several that cause infection in New York State. Most result in fairly minor illnesses (fever, rash, headache "achiness"), although some cause severe infection of the nervous system and death.

Although extremely rare, eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) is the best example of the latter. There have been only a few known cases of EEE in New York State over the past forty-five years, and most have been fatal. West Nile virus infection is more common (hundreds of cases). and although potentially fatal it is much less likely to result in death than EEE.

Two arboviruses have recently begun to cause trouble in the U.S. Dengue Fever had previously been thought to be limited to the tropics. Although cases were increasingly common in Florida and Hawaii, there are now documented cases in New York. Chikungunya, an obscure tropical disease for years, recently made its way into the U.S. via

travelers. It now appears to have been spread within our country. There have been sixtynine New York cases of this painful (rarely fatal) infection, all in travelers. (Lindsay Lohan is a "celebrity" chikungunya patient.)

Most recently, we have been hearing about a South American arbovirus infection, Zika. Although Zika has received a lot of hype. largely as a possible cause of birth defects, it is generally a mild illness.

None of these diseases has any specific therapy, so prevention of bites is the only real strategy. (I have discussed this subject in earlier columns.)

In the early days of HIV/AIDS epidemic, there was consideration of a role for insect transmission. That notion has been discarded. The reasons are complicated, but boil down to the fact that HIV survives and replicates by infecting specific cells in hosts. Mosquitoes lack these cells.
